My Peace Corps Experience

Section A

The beginning of the Peace Corps goes back to 1960, when then Senator John F. Kennedy challenged students to serve their country in the cause of peace by living and working in developing countries. From that inspiration grew an organization in the United States federal government devoted to world peace and friendship. Some 200,000+ volunteers later, the Peace Corps is still going strong today.

Section B

Like many new graduates, I left university full of hope for the future but with no real idea of what I wanted to do. My degree, with honors¹, in English literature had not really prepared me for anything useful. I knew I wanted to make a difference in the world somehow, but I had no idea how to do that. That's when I found out about the Peace Corps.

I started my journey as a Peace Corps volunteer by learning as much about the job as possible. I read as much as I could about the experiences of previous volunteers. I knew I would have to give up two years of my life and receive very little pay. I knew it would be a lot of hard work, and that I would be away from my family and friends for a very long time. In short, I did not take my decision to apply for the Peace Corps lightly. Neither did my family.

Eventually, however, I won the support of my family, and I sent in all the paperwork needed for application. After several months and countless interviews, I finally received my assignment. I would be going to a small village located a few hours from the capital city of Colombo in Sri Lanka. Where? What? Sri Lanka? I had no idea. But I was about to find out.

Section C

Stepping off the plane in Colombo for my three-month training course, I was immediately hit by two things: the heat and the smell. Firstly, it was hot. I mean, *really* hot! Growing up in northern Maine had not prepared me for the intense heat of tropical Sri Lanka.

Doing my best to get used to the heat, I was suddenly hit by something else. Though I would learn to *love* that smell over the next two years, my first experience with the earthy, spicy, incredibly strong aroma of curry nearly overpowered me.

The sensory overload² did not stop there. The people, sounds, colors, and cars—it was all new to me. And I welcomed it with the excitement of a small child with a new toy.

After completing my training, I was sent to the place where I would be spending the next two years of my life. The village was small and badly in need of decent housing. Though the people of the village were poor, they offered their homes, hearts, and food as if I were part of their own family.

I was assigned to lead a small team of local people in building a new schoolhouse for the village. The work was hard, but when the building was standing proudly on the site, we all felt a sense of fulfillment. For the next year or so, I taught in that same schoolhouse. But I sometimes think I learned more from my students than they did from me.

Sometime during that period, I realized that all those things that had seemed strange or unusual to me no longer did. And before I knew it, I returned to the U.S. a different man. The Peace Corps had changed my life forever.
