## Finding Love on Craigslist

Craigslist is a centralized network of online communities, featuring free online classified advertisements—with sections devoted to jobs, housing, personals, for sale, services, community, gigs, résumés and discussion forums.

Browse through the *Personals* section on **Craigslist** and you might stumble across an interesting little heading that says simply *Missed Connections*. Under this heading, people post descriptions of where and when they saw a stranger whom they thought they might be interested in. Some of the listings you can expect to see might go something like this: "I saw you walking your toy poodle in the park the other day, and wanted to introduce myself. But I was too shy." or "You were wearing a green T-shirt and I was wearing a red tank top. We made eye contact at the gym last week." Well, you get the idea. And as you might expect, most of these little online cries for love come to nothing.

However, that is not *always* the case. A few years ago, a young man named Dan and a young woman named Amy were on a plane together waiting in line to use the lavatory<sup>1</sup>. As they waited, they struck up a conversation with each other. It was obvious to both that they were 'into' each other, but too shy to actually make the move and exchange information. So, when the seatbelt sign went on for landing, they returned to their seats and that was it.

Returning home, it seems that neither Dan nor Amy could stop talking to their friends about each other. Their friends convinced them to try *Missed Connections*. Dan made the first move. By putting down the flight number and Amy's name, he was eventually able to track her down and make a very strong connection. In fact, the connection was so strong that after a few months, they were engaged to be married!

Surprisingly, there are more than a few stories like Dan and Amy's. However, before you start planning your perfect *Craigslist* romance, be aware that more often than not, 'missed connections' do not work out. The fact is that many people still do not even know about the section. So if someone doesn't know where to look, you probably won't find them.

Likewise, though Dan and Amy actually met, talked and interacted with one another, and made a connection, finding 'the pretty girl in the light blue sweater at the theater last week' will probably be next to impossible. If someone doesn't even know that you were interested in them, it's pretty likely they won't be out there looking for you.

But if you want to take your chances on *Missed Connections*, go for it. Just don't expect too much. After all, a fairy tale wouldn't be special if we all lived them.
